

Steel Storage Containers

What is a Steel Storage Container?

Steel storage containers (also known as shipping containers, steel cargo containers, sea cans, etc.) are not manufactured based on a regulation or standard that is referenced in the British Columbia Building Code (BCBC).

Temporary Use

A steel storage container may be used on a temporary basis and may be exempt from bylaw requirements when:

 There is a valid building permit for a principal dwelling on the property, and is being used in relation to the building permit. The steel storage container must be removed 2 months after occupancy is granted.

Permanent Use

For permanent storage use throughout the RDCO they are considered an *accessory structure*. In this case, a steel storage container is required to meet *accessory structure* regulations.

Zoning Bylaw No. 871 Regulations

Zoning Bylaw No. 871 regulates building height, setbacks, site coverage and other development standards. Regulations relevant to steel storage containers include:

- No accessory structure shall be permitted unless a principal dwelling is established on a parcel.
- No accessory structure shall be used for residential purposes.
- No accessory structure is permitted in a front or corner side setback.
- An accessory structure may be located within a rear or side setback, but if it exceeds 2m in height it shall have a minimum of 1m setback from the rear or side parcel line.

Additional Information

- Modification or stacking of containers is not permitted without direction from a structural engineer and an approved building permit.
- All buildings must meet all fire codes for storage of flammable or combustible materials and liquids.
- Within the Agricultural Land Reserve, steel storage containers are generally allowed where their use is directly <u>associated with agricultural activities</u>. Otherwise, they are not permitted unless the Agricultural Land Commission considers them to be <u>necessary for a residential use</u>.
- A <u>Development Permit</u> may be required prior to altering land or placing a steel storage container in a hazardous or environmentally sensitive area.

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
